How does the LEA plan to use funds to implement prevention and mitigation strategies in order to continuously and safely operate schools for in-person learning?

ARP ESSER funds will be used to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are, to the greatest extent feasible, consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in person learning. We recognize that safe reopening schools and sustaining safe operations to maximize in person instruction is essential for student learning and student well-being. The District will maintain the health and safety of students, educators and other district staff. To support the safe return to in-person instruction and sustain safe operation, the district developed the "Clarke County Return to In-Person Instructional Plan". This guide is updated regularly to meet the guidelines and requirements provided by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the Alabama State Department of Education and state and local health officials.

The guide includes the following prevention and mitigation strategies:

- 1. Health and Safety
- 2. High quality instructional materials and professional development
- 3. Remediation of Unfinished Learning
- 4. Facility upgrades to improve air quality and ventilation in all district buildings and campuses.

The Clarke County School District will be using a portion of our ARP ESSER III funds to address deferred maintenance projects in our buildings. The ARP ESSER III funds will be used to address (1) school facility repairs and improvements to enable operation of schools to reduce risk of virus transmission and exposure to environmental health hazards and support student health needs; and the ARP ESSER funds will be used for (2) inspecting, testing, maintaining, repairing, replacing, and upgrading projects to improve the indoor air quality in school facilities, including HVAC systems, filtering, purification and other air cleaning, control systems, and upgrades to windows and doors.

How will the LEA ensure that the evidence-based interventions will address the academic impact of lost instructional time and ensure that those interventions respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students including underrepresented student subgroups (each major racial and ethnic group, children from low-income families, children with disabilities, English Learners, gender, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care) and those who are particularly impacted disproportionately by the COVID-19 pandemic?

We will use ARP ESSER funds to identify, re-engage, and support students most likely to have experienced the impact of lost instructional time on student learning, such as:

a. Students who have missed the majority of in-person instruction during the 2019-2020

and 2020-2021 school years;

b. Students who did not consistently participate in virtual instruction when offered

during school building closures; and

c. Students most at-risk of dropping out of school

We will continue to provide mental health services and counseling services and support and address the needs of students and adults.

We will use 20% of its ARP ESSER funds to address the academic impact of lost instructional time through the implementation of evidence-based interventions and ensure that those interventions respond to students' social, emotional and academic needs. We will offer tutoring during the school day, extended day/after school programs, summer learning and enrichment programs. The district will purchase high quality instructional materials in the areas of: English Language Arts curriculum (K-12), All of the curriculums that the district plans to purchase will be used to address any forms of learning loss or the aftereffects of it.

The district is going to provide faculty, staff and PK-12 social and emotional learning support in the years ahead to address any social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students and teachers in our district. The district also plans to purchase high quality instructional materials in the core curriculum areas of Math and English Language Arts. These materials will support teachers in their efforts to get our students on grade level. During the upcoming school year, the district also plans to complete regular communication, using all available modalities, with our teachers, students and families to ensure that safety, academic engagement, and wellness are maintained throughout the 2021-2022 school year.

How will the LEA actively monitor their allocations, conduct interim audits to ensure an appropriate application of funds, collect and manage data elements required to be reported, and report this information to the community?

The Federal Programs Director along with the ESSER Coordinator will actively monitor ESSER grant allocations and prepare program budgets, schedules, and budget amendments to ensure compliance with statutory requirements. Additionally, the Federal Programs Director and ESSER Coordinator will collect and manage all required data elements by developing systems of collaboration with relevant program directors and supervisors in the collection of required data elements. Required reporting elements will be reported during an open and public Board of Education meeting. The CSFO will audit expenditures prior to requesting grant reimbursements and maintain documentation necessary for audit reporting. Clarke County Board of Education will update the procedures for ensuring compliance if necessary.

How will the LEA meaningfully engage with families and communities throughout the life of the ARP ESSER and other relief funds?

Our schools maintain a focus of connecting, engaging and sustaining our families and communities. We will continue to seek input from the public by posting the plan on our district website and providing a link for additional questions and comments. Revisions to our plan based on input will be documented at the Board of Education Meeting during the school year.

Individual schools and the district use various tools such as newsletters, memos, local newspapers, Facebook, district website, district app and other communication apps for frequent and consistent communication. We will continue expanding learning opportunities after school and during the summer. Individual schools also offer many opportunities for parents and teachers to work together to establish thriving schools by engaging community organizations and families.

ARP ESSER State Reserve Allocation to Address Loss of Instructional Time

The ALSDE is providing a State Reserve allocation to LEAs to address the loss of instructional time through the implementation of evidence-based interventions and ensure that those interventions respond to students' social, emotional, and academic needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on underrepresented student subgroups.

- 1. Summer Learning & Summer Enrichment Programs
- 2. Comprehensive After-School Programs

The Clarke County Summer Reading Camps will comply with the Alabama Literacy Act by ensuring that they are staffed with highly effective teachers as demonstrated by student performance data and have received training in multisensory structured language education as well as other criteria provided in the Act. Seventy hours of scientifically based reading instruction will be provided. Student progress will be determined using the approved early reading assessment. The Summer Reading Camps will be available to all K-3 students that are below benchmark as determined on said assessment. Fully vetted intervention programs and materials will be utilized.

Clarke County will host Summer Learning/Enrichment Camps at each middle and high school during the summers of 2022-2024. We will provide remediation to counter the negative effects of COVID on student learning. We will also offer enrichment opportunities to engage students and offer new experiences in our efforts to close opportunity gaps, develop social skills and appeal to student interests.

The high school math team offers after school tutoring for students who perform at different skill levels. Using classroom performance data, teachers build customized learning plans that aligns with state standards and are designed to fit the specific needs of the students and working at a pace that meet their needs. Time is also spent with students who want "refreshers" due to lost learning. Program goal is better mastery of the subject matter and building self esteem and confidence that may have been lost during COVID -19 for students.

Indicate the data sources the LEA used to identify the students most in need of the program(s) and the extent to which the LEA will evaluate the impact of the program(s).

The Summer Reading Camps will be available to all K-3 students that are below benchmark as determined by the system's Early Literacy Assessment. End of year Early Literacy Assessment data (Amplify mCLASS) will be used to determine instructional goals for each student that attends Camp. Progress monitoring will help to determine if appropriate instruction is being provided during Camp. End of camp data, administered within the last five days of Camp, will determine if growth in defined areas of foundational reading were made by students.

The Summer Learning/Enrichment Camps will be available to all 4-12 students. Schools will use classroom performance assessments and STAR 360 results to identify students most in need of remediation or intervention. These results will also be used to identify students who would benefit from enrichment opportunities, sharpen social skills and academic skill boosts. End of course assessments and/or project analysis and STAR 360 data will be the evaluation tools used to determine if appropriate instruction was provided during summer camp sessions.

The high school math team uses classroom performance assessments and STAR 360 results to identify students most in need of remediation or intervention. Time will be scheduled to enhance skills they already know and remediate and strengthen the skills they need help on. End of course assessments and STAR 360 data will be the evaluation tools used to determine if appropriate instruction was provided during extended day sessions.

Using the allocation from the ARP ESSER State Reserve, explain how the LEA will identify and engage

- 1) students who have missed the most in-person instruction during the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years; and
- 2) students who did not consistently participate in remote instruction when offered during school building closures.

Students that qualify for Summer Reading Camp will be identified based on learning loss as evidenced through student data from the system's Early Literacy Assessment. This assessment will help identify those that have learning gaps due to either the loss of in-person instruction or those that did not consistently participate in remote instruction during building closures.

Students that are identified based on evidence through student data will be given an opportunity to participate in the Summer Learning/Enrichment Camps. The programs will concentrate on immediate academic problems and/or engage students in expanding academic knowledge. These camp opportunities will benefit those who have learning loss or those seeking academic enrichment due to loss of in-person instruction or those that did not consistently participate in remote instruction drying building closures.

Students that are identified based on evidence through student data will be given an opportunity to participate in the extended day program. The program will focus on immediate problems, such as homework help and test prep, while filling in any foundational gaps in their mathematical knowledge. This intervention addresses gaps in knowledge for students who experienced loss of in-person instruction or those that did not consistently participate in remote instruction during building closures.

1) ARP ESSER State Reserve funds will be used to host Literacy Act Summer Reading Camps for Clarke County K-3 students identified through the early literacy assessment, Amplify, as below benchmark will be held at Grove Hill Elementary School and Gillmore Elementary School. These camps will run for four weeks for four days a week. Students will receive intense reading instruction from highly qualified teachers that have been hired based on student performance data and training in the science of reading among other criteria. Students will receive seventy hours of reading instruction including the vetted intervention programs, SPIRE and Phonics First. All Camp teachers will have been trained in the delivery of these programs. Camp hours will also include additional instruction in phonemic awareness, phonics/word work, fluency practice, read alouds and responsive writing, vocabulary, and comprehension all based on the science of reading. Current Building Reading Specialists will serve as Camp Directors and will oversee daily attendance, instruction, and assessments. They will also work with Camp teachers in planning and adjusting instruction, as well as modeling and coaching teachers to ensure that appropriate instruction is provided. Total Cost: \$438,642

2) Each school will hire 1 camp director, 5 camp teachers, office aide, school nurse, instructional aide Total: 2 camp directors, 10 teachers, 2 office aides, 2 instructional aides and 2 school nurses.
